Join us for this interdisciplinary workshop covering the intersection of economics, public policy, history, and the criminal justice system. Students interested in the NCFCA debate topics will learn the economics, history, and jurisprudence of the criminal justice system. Economic principles and lessons from history help students better understand today's law and justice issues, and the role of private sector security, courts, and prisons.

The revised LD topic will also be discussed: *Resolved: In the pursuit of justice, due process ought to be valued above the discovery of fact.* Presentations on the economics and history of the federal criminal justice system, and

problems caused by New Deal legislation expanding federal powers across the U.S. economy. Much of business and everyday life is now touched by vague and complex federal legislation carrying criminal penalties often arbitrarily enforced.

- **Gregory Rehmke** directs Economic Thinking, and speaks at Institute for Economic Studies-Europe, FEE, and Independent Institute seminars.
