Join us for this interdisciplinary workshop covering the intersection of economics, public policy, history, and the criminal justice system. Homeschool debaters interested in the NCFCA debate topics will learn the economics, history, and jurisprudence of criminal justice in the status quo, and in various reform proposals. Economic principles and lessons from history help students better understand today's law and justice issues, and the role of private sector security, courts, and prisons.



Presentations will cover the economics and history of the federal criminal justice system, and federal legislation expanding environmental and business "crimes." Ever more aspects of everyday life are touched by vague and complex federal legislation carrying criminal penalties often arbitrarily enforced.
